

The History and Mission of Lunenburg ROAR

The Lunenburg ROAR Task force is a group of concerned citizens who came together last spring 2017 to ask the question "what we can do to make a difference in Lunenburg with regards to the current Opioid Crisis?" It is made up of clergy, The Lunenburg Boys & Girls Club, Lunenburg fire and police departments, educators, medical and clinical practitioners, and community members at large. We have brainstormed, visited other communities to attend programs, and observed what they were doing regarding Substance Use education, awareness and resources. Some of us in the group have been personally affected by the opioid problem, or addiction in general. We were all learning.

- If you know someone or are related to someone who is struggling with substance use, you are not alone. In Central Mass alone last year, we have lost over 100 people, statewide well over 1,000 and across our country 64,000 deaths associated with opioid related overdoses in 2016. This truly is a national crisis and at epidemic proportions.
- If you have not been touched somehow by it, you are unusual.
- This problem does not discriminate., no matter your socioeconomic status, race, religion or education.

The disease of addiction is real, it is devastating to the individual as well as their loved ones and it is happening in Lunenburg with those we know and love.

The **3 main goals** of ROAR are to:

continuously

- Increase awareness of the disease of substance use and addiction
- Provide fact-based information to encourage healthy choices and safe decision making
- Provide information about support and resources to those in active addiction or in recovery, as well as their families, and members of our community and beyond.

Over the past year ROAR has presented three major programs for the community of Lunenburg. They are as follows:

October 24, 2017

Our "Opioid Forum" was very well received by our community with about 220 people in attendance. We showed the Wahlberg film "If Only" and had a diverse panel of guests, which included a parent whose child died from an overdose, a doctor specializing in substance abuse recovery, two young adults recovering from substance, representatives from our police and fire department, and a clinician who started a support program for families struggling with this issue, and the founder of a recovery program. We had about fifteen vendors sharing information.

March 15, 2018

"Substance Use: How Families Can Help" was our second event with about 60 people present. It was a more intimate gathering than our forum. Cathy Tellides Jaffee, PhD, Clinical Psychologist specializing in substance use issues, and an Instructor in Psychology at Hardvard Medical School as well as a clinical Associate at Mclean hospital, was our presenter. Dr. Jaffee covered an amazing amount of material in one evening, in a clear and engaging format.

April 12, 2018

"Well Being and Resilience at Scale" was our third event. Retired Army Brig. Gen. Rhonda Cornum shared her personal story about being capture during the Persian Gulf War. She described how her resiliency and positive thought got her through the ordeal when she returned home. The goal of the event was to help build mental health and resilience town wide. These skills may help in the prevention of substance abuse.

We are proposing the following program for next fall: November 1, 2018

"The Physiology of Addiction", by Dr. Ruth Potee, is the next program we would like to present. We would learn more about how substances and addictive behaviors impact the brain and how the brain is injured by prolonged exposure to these substances and behaviors. The teenage brain is especially susceptible because it is still developing.
